# **Driving in Sun Glare**

In the fall and winter, the sun is lower on the horizon and drivers are often challenged by driving with the sun in their eyes. Although driving in the sun's glare is a year-round challenge, it's wise to always be prepared, especially when the glare is more intense. Blocking the sun can mean blocking your view of traffic and hazards ahead resulting in dangerous driving conditions.

On resource roads, sun glare can obstruct your ability to spot wildlife and can make blind corners more challenging to navigate. Sun reflecting off the snow can intensify the bright conditions further reducing visibility.

Sun glare is often a factor in collisions, particularly when vehicles are exiting from side roads into the path of oncoming traffic. It is also a contributing factor in rear-end collisions when stationery or slow-moving vehicles are not seen.

Sun glare also increases risks for pedestrians and motorcyclists. Their smaller size increases their risk as they are easily hidden in the sun's bright glare.

Stay alert at intersections on sunny days and don't assume other drivers can seen you. Even if you are not affected by the sun's glare, someone else may be.



## **Tips To Reduce Sun Glare**

- Use your visor and consider investing in polarized sunglasses. They help reduce glare.
- Leave more space between your vehicle and the vehicles in front or next to you. When the sun is in your eyes, it can be harder to see what other vehicles are doing.
- Drive with your headlights on to increase your visibility to other drivers.

When you make proper adjustments, you will minimize any added risks that come with less-thanoptimal visual conditions. Safe travels!
